
Areas of the site are subject to seasonal flooding. Bounded by the River Avon to the West and by Clackers Brook to the South the plan shows the extents flood risk as defined by the Environment Agency's Flood Map for Planning (https://flood-map-for-planning.service. gov.uk/).


The plan identifies the significant risk of flooding presented by Clackers Brook on the southern edge of the site.

Flood Zone	Definition
Zone 1 Low Probability	Land having a less than 1 in 1,000 annual probability of river or sea flooding. (Shown as 'clear' on the Flood Map – all land outside Zones 2 and 3)
Zone 2 Medium Probability	Land having between a 1 in 100 and 1 in 1,000 annual probability of river flooding; or land having between a 1 in 200 and 1 in 1,000 annual probability of sea flooding.
Zone 3 High Probability	Land having a 1 in 100 or greater annual probability of river flooding; or Land having a 1 in 200 or greater annual probability of sea flooding.(Land shown in dark blue on the Flood Map)

Note: The Flood Zones shown on the Environment Agency's Flood Map for Planning (Rivers and Sea) do not take account of the possible impacts of climate change and consequent changes in the future probability of flooding.

Public Consultation

Consultation Process

The consultation was launched in February 2018

In March representatives from NVB Landscape and Melksham town council met with members of the public at a consultation session hosted within the Cricket pavillion.

To invite the broadest range of reponses multiple formats of response were offered at the consultation session.

- Pinned to the wall were large format presentation sheets including a plan layout of the existing park listing key features and constraints within the park.
 On the plan the question was posed: 'What do you think: Where is your favourite place? Where don't you like? Sticky label dots were supplied to plot out responses.
- As a fun activity for adults and children alike we invited the recording of local knowledge and opinion on a series of large format paper plan printouts (see image right).
 The pots of pens, pencils and markers were used to record ideas, notes, comments and aspirations for the park.
- An A4 form with a formal series of survey questions was provided to focus respondents on key questions about the park.


Subsequent to the event the forms accompanied by an A1 presentation board were displayed in a series of public spaces around the town centre. Completed forms were collected in a collection box attached to the presentation board.

Response

All responses to the consultation were recorded and reviewed. In reviewing the responses it became apparent very quickly that there were common themes running throughout.

Wordclouds (worditout.com) were generated from the responses relating to the questions;

- What do people dislike about the Park?
- What do people like most about the Park?
- What are the improvements that people would like to see?

The word size and colour are a reflection of frequency.

The green space and open quality of the park is valued by many of consultees. This is key for dog walkers and events such as the Party in the Park.

The park is on many peoples route to and from the town centre and it is also part of longer distance walks out of the town along the river Avon. The new splashpad is much anticipated and will help make the park a destination.

This was part of a recurrent theme throughout the responses for a broadening of appeal to provide something for all ages. A café, public toilets, a broader provision of play equipment suitable for all ages of children and also a call for providing improved amenity value to the older generation and people visiting without children.

Connected by a new path to the Splash Pad and a new frontage onto the car park the pavillion would be remodelled to better suit current uses, such as a base for Party in the Park and Park Run. Adding a Café would make the building a focal point within the park.

Adventure Play Area

The existing adventure play area is a popular feature within the park, particularly the zip wire. This area of play equiptment is intended for used by children perhaps too old for the childrens play area but not necessarily quite independent of parental supervision. The proposed move of the childrens play area would necessitate relocation of the adventure play area. Keeping the two areas close is convenient for use by families with children of ages that straddle the two areas. It also eases the transition for children from the younger equipment up to bigger adventure equipment. The location is also convenient for the café, picnic area and toilets.







Sport facilities

The cricket pitch has not been formally used as a sports pitch for some time. An all weather games court associated with the school is available for hire, but is not suited to impromptu sports use.

There is an opportunity to offer new/improved sports provision within the park by developing the sports area immediately beside the Waitrose car park.

Currently the area has an area of asphalt equipped with a basketball hoop but this space could be more effectively utilised. A space could be made to layout a multifunctional grass pitch and a small informal area of all weather surface. The grass pitch could include markings for sports including and upto a pitch for under 9s football. The all weather surface could inclorporate a hoop for basketball markings for street snooker etc.

The grass sports pitch would be positioned such that flooding events would cause minimal disruption to the use of the pitch.

Childrens play area

The Childrens play area is currently sited within the flood area of Clackers Brook. It is proposed that the area should be moved out from the flood zone to an area closer to new public toilets, changing and café facilities. Taking advantage of these facilities would also be the new splash pad feature. Noted as an aspiration by many of the consultees, the splash pad has already been funded and paid for as a replacement for the now demolished paddling pool.

The park benefits from a fine selection of mature parkland trees which line a walk that runs parallel to Lowbourne. It is proposed that the genteel quality of this area of the park could be enhanced with planting and new bench seating to create a sensory garden. The millenium mosaic could be integrated within the design of this area.

The boundary will be defined by traditional rail fencing which will keep a portion of the park seperated from the more active uses beyond. The area would continue to be open at either end for access through and along the walk but gates would prevent access by unsupervised dogs. Dogs would only be permitted if on leads.

Pergolas or similar gateway feature would mark the entrance/end of the walk.

Clackers Brook

Environment Agency flood risk data supported the many respondents to the consultation who highlighted the issue of flooding in the park. Flooding effects the banks of the Avon and Clackers Brook. The brook is liable to flash flooding events that annecdotaly disrupt the function of the childrens play area at least twice a year.

A more suitable location has been identified within the park for the play area which would give the opportunity to try a different approach along the brook corridor.

It is possible that the brook could be reformed from a disruptive force into a key asset within the park. The potential is there to make the brook corridor a place for wildlife, flood prevention and an area for natural play. Features such as swales and ponds could be added to contribute to flood prevention and improve water quality. Low intensity managment of the area could improve biodiversity and safeguard routes for wildlife. The wet woodland habitat created could accomodate woodland paths or play trails with tree climbing and stepping stones as an foil to the formal play equipment elsewhere within the park.

Main Path

Though possible to 'do a circuit' of the park the current route is not clearly marked, includes a narrow lane with vehicular traffic and negortiating thorugh a car park. Creating a clear route around the park would have broad appeal including opportunity for measured fitness activity. The path would be designed to be of a suitable width to accomodate individuals, small groups, and runners.

To further encourage activity in the park and in answer to the call for more 'exercise equipment' it is proposed that along the route could be a trim trail.

Consultation


